Brandeston Hall's Expedition to Morocco - 2009



At the end of March, Mr Myers-Allen, embarked on an ambitious venture to Morocco with ten students from Year 7.

The Headmaster was accompanied by the Deputy Head, Robin Sampson, and Adrian Lawson, a parent with a thirst for adventure. The party headed off to the heart of the Atlas Mountains and together with the help of Far Frontiers Expeditions Ltd., they created a hugely successful trip of a lifetime for the young Brandestonians.

The journey began in the bustling, airless labyrinth of the souks in Marrakech, where

acrobats and frenzied snake charmers performed alongside zealous date and spice merchants.

The party then headed to the hills to stay in the basic terraced Berber villages, with their flat roofed and clay walled dwellings, nestling in the shadows of snow-capped mountains and a world away from the confines of modern life. The youngsters trekked for 7 days and walked for over 8 hours a day, through the irrigated barley fields, and up past the arid juniper forests to the passes and snowlines at over 2500m. They stayed with the locals,



played football with the children, repaired stone walls, and visited mosques, families and farms. Each member of the team generously gave gifts to the children that flocked to greet them in every dusty village that they passed through. On each trek they were accompanied by an entourage of mules, porters, cooks and guides. The expeditioners adjusted to the basic conditions admirably. They bartered for everything and took it in turns to lead the expedition and assume roles with levels of skill that went beyond their years.

The journey ended in the fortified coastal fishing town of Essaouira, with it's honeycomb of souks.

The extraordinary trip has kindled a spirit of adventure that will develop within the school over the years to come, and a similar trip is planned for next year.

Brandeston Hall Hangar Dance



BRANDESTON HALL IN SENSATIONAL ATHLETICS FORM

Brandeston Hall started the athletics season in record-breaking form in balmy conditions at The Suffolk Amateur Athletics Association Championships at Northgate Stadium in Ipswich.

Gold medallists included Susannah Reid in the Under 1500 metres and Oliver Thornton in the Under 15 Boys' Hurdles. 12 other Silver and bronze medals were also achieved. Full details of the recipients are on the school website.

The school have continued their outstanding athletics season by winning the North Suffolk Boys' and Girls' Under 12 Athletics Championships. The Championships, which were held at Brandeston, saw the girls' team captained by Emma Owen win the title for the fourth time in as many years and the boys led by Roman Engelbrecht retain their titles of 2005, 2007 and 2008.



The pupils who were clearly delighted with their performances can now look forward to the East of England Championships and the County Cup.

An extra mention most go to Susannah, whose running achievements continue to grow. With the hat-trick of Anglian Prep Schools' cross-country titles under her belt, Susannah has gained the confidence to continue her middle-distance running on the track. This term Susannah has already beaten the school 1500m record by 4 seconds and the 3000m record, which has been unbroken for 17 years, by an astonishing 3 minutes. As a result of these performances, Susannah has been invited to the National Schools' Athletic Championship to be held at Sheffield in July.

Cricketing honour for Brandeston boys



Kristian Williman and Gavin Kiernan (pictured L-R), both in Year 8, have achieved the honour of being the first boys in Suffolk to receive the prestigious Centurions Award. The Lord's Taverners launched this award last year to recognise the achievement of boys and girls under the age of 18 scoring their first century in an organised club or school cricket match.

The boys scored early season centuries against South Lee and Barnardiston Hall preparatory schools. They have each received certificates endorsed by the 10 living batsmen to have scored 100 first-class centuries: Zaheer Abbas, Dennis Amiss, Geoffrey Boycott, John Edrich, Graham Gooch, Tom Graveney, Graeme Hick, Mark Ramprakash, Vivian Richards and Glenn Turner.

Kristian, who is vice-captain of Norfolk Under 13s, also plays for Under 14s, as well as being part of Norfolk's Cricket Academy. He has been in prolific form for Brandeston Hall this summer, averaging over 50 with the bat and with over 20 wickets to his name already!
