# The Headmaster Mr Paul Taylor

I hope you enjoy our new-look Newsletter. With our website and weekly e-bulletin now offering regular updates on @ews@at the College, these newsletters take on a different role, and provide an opportunity to celebrate and reflect on all that has been going on at the College. We aim to produce a couple of newsletters per year, with the Spring edition reflecting on the long Autumn Term and the early part of the Spring Term, while in the Autumn we will look back on the remainder of the year.

The school year started with the celebration of record GCSE results; over half of the grades awarded were A or A\*s, and a third of our pupils gained 7 or more grades at A or above. At A level, we enjoyed a pass rate of 99.2%, and over the past three years our students have achieved an average of over 70% A\*-B grades. In a difficult year for university entry, it was reassuring to know that the vast majority of our students gained entry to the university of their choice.

The rest of this newsletter will provide a snapshot of all that went on at the College last term. In sport, outstanding 1st teams in both girls Ohockey and boys Orugby led the way, but it was equally rewarding to see so many boys and girls representing the College at all levels and in a wide range of sports. ## Intellectual Challenge

Students gain a unique experience from the United Nations activities at the College giving them an enhanced awareness of world issues and possible attempts to address them. The Students' League of Nations takes place every year at the Palais des Nations in Geneva and Gavin Stacey & Poppy Roy (Canada), Emma Vidler & Mimi O'Neill (Brunei) and Christina Welsh & Sam Weya (Haiti) spent two months researching their country's attitudes to the four resolutions to be debated. The subjects under discussion were: controls on cyber weapons; security for humanitarian aid; the establishment of an open border policy and, finally, the banning of any Islamic clothing which covers the face.

Hosted by students of the International Schools of Geneva, the delegates not only debated the issues but also gained an insight into the lives of those who live in such an international city. They returned tired but intellectually challenged by what they had experienced.







# **Expeditions at Framlingham**

## 'Impressive Success'

The busy schedule of Duke of Edinburgh expeditions at the College begins with two-day Bronze expeditions around the Suffolk countryside. Once successful, many get to grips with the requirements of the Silver award by embarking on the physical, volunteering and skill sections via our extensive activities programme. Later in the year, with the Bronze award complete, students have the opportunity to set off to the Peak District, Yorkshire Dales and Lake Coniston to attempt Silver and Gold.

They have an impressive success rate in each of the D of E categories, which leads many to participate in expeditions further afield. In July 2011 two teams will spend 14 days in Borneo travelling down the Kinabatangan River and tackling a conservation project in a local village. Whilst staying with local families it is hoped that they will help in the construction of two water towers for the local community. They will return having gained experience in running and organising their own trip and liaising with local guides on what will be a genuine journey of self-discovery.
